The Payee Services Program provides individualized financial management to disabled individuals and seniors who are unable to manage their own financial affairs so they can live independently and gain financial self-sufficiency.

Access Our Services

To initiate our Payee Services, CSS must first receive a referral from the individual or a social service organization in the community.

Once the Social Security Administration officially delegates us as the your payee, we will contact you to formulate a workable budget for your specific financial situation.

We can also manage other forms of income such as pensions, paychecks, and settlement funds.

Our service coordinators help low-income seniors live independently and remain in their homes by linking them with needed resources. CSS has placed a service coordinator at each of the 14 diocesan-owned Seton Square Senior affordable housing communities where they assist when seniors are confronted by new challenges such as medical or health issues, tax laws or benefits, or technological hurdles beyond their skill level. This intervention increases seniors' quality of life and allows them to continue living in their homes with confidence.



After seeing the incredible, evidence-based results of Catholic Charities Fort Worth's Stay the Course® case management program, we applied to bring it to central Ohio.

We were one of three agencies nationally to win \$1.2 million to replicate Stay the Course. In pilot locations, students who receive Stay the Course services increase their success of graduating at a rate four times higher than those who don't receive services.



The Percentage of Income Payment Plan (PIPP) helps eligible Ohioans manage their energy bills year- round. Payments are based on a percentage of household income and are consistent year-round.

If your home is heated with gas, you will have a monthly payment of 6% of your household income for your natural gas bill, and 6% of your household income for your electric bill. If you heat with electric, your monthly payment is 10% of your household income. The balance of your utility bill is subsidized by the state of Ohio. There is a minimum monthly payment of \$10.00.


